What is SOC?

Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes are the UK government's official method of sorting jobs into categories.

SOC4 sorts all jobs into 370 different categories, SOC3 has 90 categories, and SOC2 has 25.

Here's an example of how it works. The Unifrog careers profile 'Classical musician' goes into the SOC4 category 'Musicians', which goes into the SOC3 category 'Artistic, literary and media occupations', which in turn goes into the SOC2 category 'Culture, Media and Sports occupations'.

Each career profile will give you access to Labour Market Information.

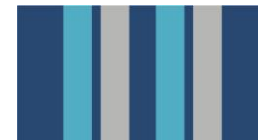
The UK National Qualifications Framework:

In the UK – when we achieve qualifications we pass various levels. Passing one level enables you to work towards the next. Sometimes we can finish one level and jump higher – e.g. Level 3(A-Levels/T-Level/BTEC) followed by Level 6 or 7 (Bachelors Degree / Masters Degree).

Pros	Cons
You gain a degree which may help you progress your career	May not gain work experience *could do industry year/internship instead
Taught by academics / industry experts	Fewer opportunities to gain employability skills?
Meet new people and friends	Finance – significant loan repayment
There is a lot of reading to do!	There is a lot of reading to do!
Independence / learn how to look after yourself	Finance – living off small amount
Can join clubs and societies	Joining workforce 3 or more years later
Potential for employment afterwards	Exams and coursework





1. Study a Level 4/5 course at university, or at a local college:

- Local examples include: Animal Behaviour/Science, Business, Construction, Counselling, Computing, Education, Engineering, Sport, Wildlife and countryside, zoo management, etc.
- Sometimes apply direct to college and sometimes through UCAS – check with college.
- Can often 'top up' to degree by spending a year or two at university/college later.

2. *Study a foundation year – useful if you do not yet have the subjects or grades for your dream course

universities have varying guidelines regarding what/who qualifies

3. You can study part time or distance learning – search on UCAS, look at Open University. Spread the cost – but a much longer commitment (often 6 years). MOOCs (free online university study) such as Future Learn + via www.unifrog.org

Higher Technical Qualifications (HTQs)

Higher Technical Qualifications (HTQs) are level 4 and level 5 qualifications, such as Foundation Degrees, Higher National Certificates and Higher National Diplomas. They are an option for young people starting their career and for adults looking to upskill or retrain.

HTQs have been approved against employer developed standards, also known as occupational standards. This ensures that learners gain the skills that employers want, and employers can be confident that learners have the knowledge, skills and behaviours for a particular specialist role.

The qualifications last between 1 and 2 years full-time, with part-time and distance learning options available.

HTQs are available across the digital sector, health and science, and construction.

To become an HTQ and display the HTQ quality mark, qualifications must be approved against occupational standards. The Quality Mark was introduced because of the growing demand for skills at these levels.

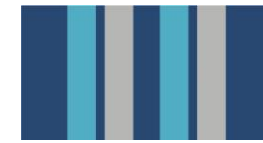

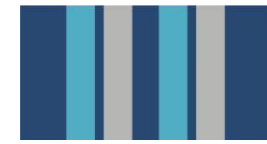

Apprenticeships...

- ✓ A real job
- ✓ Last minimum of 12 months and up to 6 years
- ✓ (Traineeships can last up to 12 months, but usually up to 6 months)
- ✓ Range from level 2 to level 7
- ✓ Are at Intermediate (2/GCSE), Advanced (3/A-level), Higher (4-5) and Degree (6&7) Level

Apprentices...

- ✓ Do not pay for their training
- ✓ Receive 20% off-the-job learning (college, university, in-house, external training provider)
- ✓ Spend 80% of their time on-the-job
- ✓ Earn a salary – current minimum pay = £6.50 per hour (as at 20.09.2024)
- ✓ Gain invaluable experience and skills





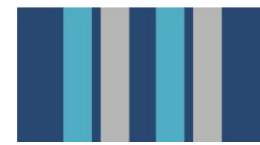

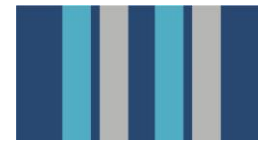

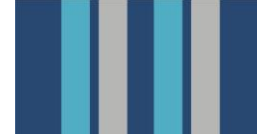

Overview of the role

Creating news items using a combination of words, pictures and moving images.

Details of standard

Occupation summary

This occupation is found in media businesses such as TV, radio, online, social media and print (newspapers, digital publishing and magazines), public relations and communications.

The broad purpose of the occupation is to inform the public- either through news and current events, or through the creation of authoritative features, opinion or analysis.

In their daily work, an employee in this occupation interacts with colleagues within the same organisation, representatives of other businesses/organisations and members of the general public.

An employee in this occupation will be responsible for finding, researching and creating journalistic content tailored to brand needs and target audience in a deadline driven environment. The content can include: news, features, reviews, documentaries, covering live events, researching data, shooting, recording and editing video, recording and editing audio interviews and creating podcasts.

The content could be used to inform or entertain on TV, radio, online, social media or in print. This could be across multiple genres; from crime to politics, to technology to sport to fashion. A journalist will source material, speak to contacts, conduct interviews and produce content as required in a timely way.

They will talk directly and engage with the audience in what can be unpredictable and testing circumstances.

Things to consider...

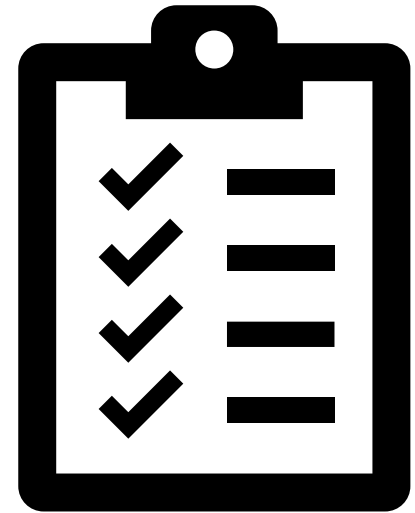
- **Work and study** – organising and balancing time as an apprentice
- **Entry requirements**
- **Qualification & Future prospects**
- **Travel** – feasibility of travel / costs?
- **References** – who? Usually require x2
Teachers, Head of Year, Club Leader, Part-time Employer
- **Applications, assessments and interviews**
(the more you do the easier it becomes / faster you become)
- **Potential benefits and challenges**





What is involved in getting an apprenticeship? (the application process)...

- Application – usually online
- Online assessment? e.g. English/Maths/ +/- Aptitude test
- Phone / virtual interview?
- Assessment Centre? Group tasks, In-tray exercise, assessment
- Face-to-Face interview
- Background checks – e.g. references, eligibility, DBS, etc.





Pros

- ✓ Work experience

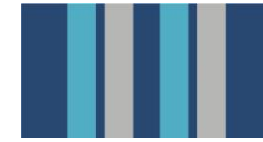


Cons:

- ✓ Balancing work & study
- ✓ Ready to choose specific job?
(it's ok to make "a mistake" –
exploring/experience = good)
- ✓ Applying takes time (not just 1 or 2)
- ✓ More opportunities in certain sectors/less in others
- ✓ May need to widen net (e.g.
distance, job sector, level)
- ✓ Not to rely on just one or two applications
- ✓ Back-up options important



Where and when to search and apply – top tips...



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Start searching now – get in practice! Finding and securing an apprenticeship can take time!

Search and apply on a regular basis – e.g. weekly/every 2 weeks. Do not rely on a handful of applications. Keep going until you secure an apprenticeship & sign contract

Search and apply from the beginning of Year 13 – degree / higher apprenticeships may be listed from September of Year 13 onwards. Some companies post opportunities all year round – Don't miss out!

Consider and apply for back-up options – e.g. university, employment, gap year, etc.

Sign-up to opportunity email alerts where possible

Prepare well for applications, interviews, assessments, + possible 2nd interviews

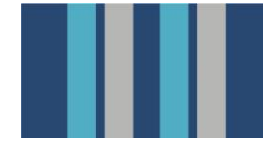




Exploring the Main post 18 options:

3) **Gap Year** – a year between leaving school and starting university, an apprenticeship or a job





- To **develop skills** – communication, organisation, initiative
- To **gain knowledge** – about people, places, organisations, projects
- For the **experience** – maturing, perhaps life changing, new people and cultures
- **Make a contribution** - to an ethical project, volunteer, teamwork
- **Meet new people** – make new friends and contacts, networking
- **For a break** - from studying, refreshed for your degree, preparing yourself
- **Increase your employability** – all this aids personal development, of interest to employers and universities



Gap year

- ✓ **Opportunities:**
 - travel (?£3-4,000 for 1 year)
 - volunteering
 - formal programmes (e.g.
 - internships
- ✓ **How long?** (usually less than a year)
- ✓ **Check** financial requirements
- ✓ **Budget** – raise money, work, save, etc.

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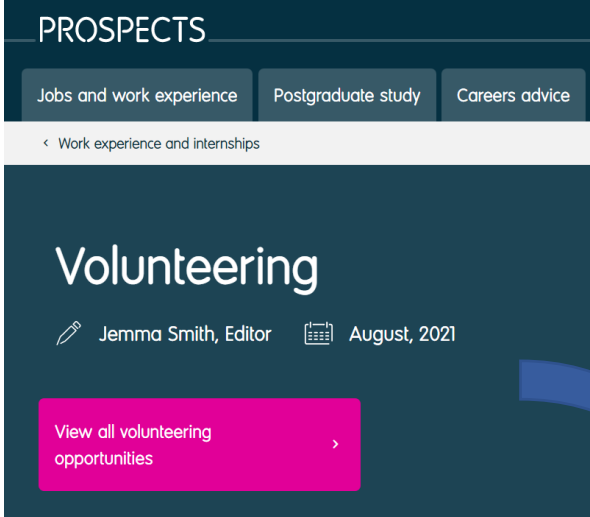

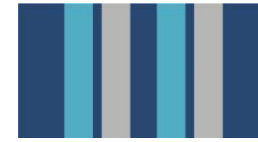

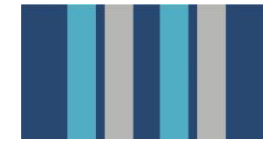

- It's a **big decision**
- Involving **lots of planning**
- There is a **time commitment**
- It **could be costly**
- It will **require motivation** – you need independence, initiative and drive
- **You may be distant** – from home, family and friends
- There will be a **change of focus** – can you get back on track afterwards

Recap: Make a plan for a gap year!



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- **Have a goal!** - your planned activities should contribute to your future plans.
- **University** – will you apply and defer? Or will you apply next year (know your dates). Include your plans in your personal statement
- **Timescales** – will you travel, for when and how long?
- **Budget** – will you work and save, earn whilst travelling, apply for a grant
- **Practicalities of travelling** - compare providers, plan all the costs (flights, living costs, insurance, equipment), get insured, health – e.g. immunisations, arrange a work visa, record your trip - blogs, photographs, staying in contact - phone, skype, email.

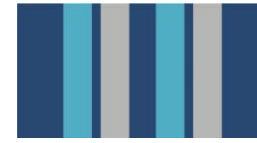

4) Employment





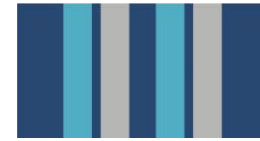
Why choose to go straight to employment after Year 13?

- You want to **gain experience**
- You are a **hands-on/practical learner**
- You feel **ready for the workplace**
- Full time **university is costly**
- ***You feel ready***

Many employers now offer apprenticeship and other schemes for school leavers. Allowing you to combine work and study – perhaps to university level.



- **Offers experience** in an industry of interest
- **Opportunity to try something out** – if you are still unsure
- Provides **training opportunities** and promotion paths
- Allows **development and demonstration of skills** – to show employers/universities what you can do
- **Provides useful funds** to put towards travel/university or other plans
- **Opportunity** for self-development and CV building



- Who are the **main employers in your sector**?
- Who does this work **within your local area**?
- Which **vacancy sources** do employers use for the jobs you want?
- Who are the **professional membership bodies** for these employers?
- Which **social media platforms** are most useful? (e.g. LinkedIn, Twitter, Facebook, etc.)
- **Talk to everyone** about careers and opportunities – parents, friends, teachers, employers, sports teams, careers advisers ...

- **Research employers that work in your industry** some large employers have sought after apprenticeship or school leaver training programmes that are advertised widely with details on their careers webpages.
- **Check regularly for vacancies** – helpful to find smaller employers, who may be more local, with one-off apprenticeships. Use industry specific vacancy sources. Also - general job websites.
- **Contact employers directly** - Do your research and talk to your contacts – employers may be willing to chat to you about entry positions (perhaps with training).
- **Use social media** – LinkedIn, Instagram, Facebook Twitter, learn who is who in your industry.
- **Visit recruitment or industry events** – check professional body websites and also websites such as <https://www.thejobfairs.co.uk/>, <https://targetjobs.co.uk/events>,

There is no one place to look – you need to investigate fully!



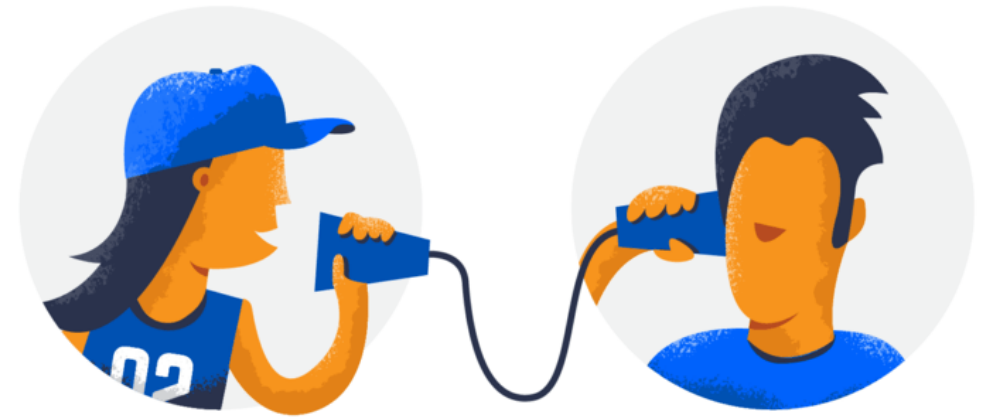

Understanding your **opportunities**

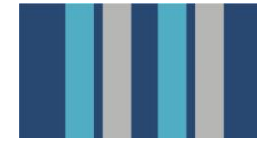
- Do you understand the different paths available into your careers of interest?

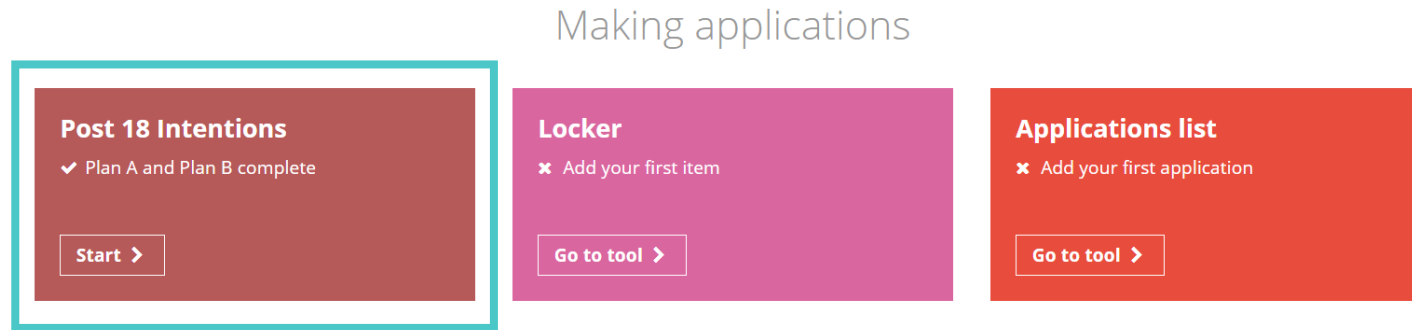

A Skill is...something you can learn (and master) through repetition.

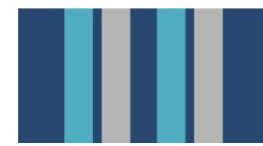
A Competence: refers to skills and knowledge while being more than just the skill or knowledge itself. It includes ability and behaviour.

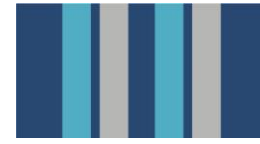


Preparing for life after Year 13 – top tips...



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- **Look ahead** and prepare
- **Research**, research, research
- **Book and attend** open events / careers events, utilise tools – e.g. UNIFROG
- **Apply** for a first choice + back-up options
- A formal / planned Gap Year is valuable
- **Write down** application deadlines
- **Keep track of** correspondence / follow through with application process
- **Encourage** your young person to check Google Classroom + emails
- **Encourage** your young person to search and apply EARLY / by deadline – popular places can fill up quickly.
- **It is ok not to be sure** – the key is to take steps forward - we can explore ideas and change direction
- **Keep communicating**, make suggestions, bounce ideas, avoid telling what to do
- **Don't panic**
